## Program News


### English as Second Language




## Leading Your Child to Reading

- Talk to and with your child.
- Listen to your child and encourage his/her listening.
- Share at least one book everyday with your child.
- Select a quiet, comfortable place to share a book with your child. Before bed or nap time is good.
- Make reading time a fun family ritual. Allow for the age and needs of your child. If it's not fun, don't do it!
- Share stories from your life, family, work, and have your child share stories of his/her daily life with you.
- Your child is never too young to be read to! Start when your child is still an infant. Start even when you are pregnant. Even before they are born, babies respond to sound and language.
- It is ok, even good, to read the same book/story over and over to a child. Children love to hear books repeated many times. Do not be upset if your child tries to turn the pages or talks while you are reading. This is normal. Children, especially young ones, often need to touch the book, even put it in their mouths, and to be active while being read to. It may take time for your child to learn to sit still and enjoy being read to. Please be patient.
- Children need to see reading as a fun thing to do if they are to become good readers.
- Use every reading opportunity that you can with your child. Point out at least one beautiful (interesting, unusual) thing everyday and help your child to use his/her imagination.
- Think and talk about the stories that you read as you go about your daily life.
- Even when your children can read, they still need to be read to! Even adults enjoy being read to.
- Encourage your child to remember, imagine, and fantasize and to share his/her remembrances, imaginings and fantasies.
- Young children need to hear language. It can be spoken, read, or sung. They need to play with words and rhymes and songs. Music is wonderful and your child will love to listen and sing with you.
- Remember, a child's work is his/her play; therefore, play is an essential part of the child's life and he/she needs to play every day. Children learn much about their life and their world through their play.
- Take your child to the library. Have the librarian help you pick out books your child will enjoy. Remember, all the books in the library are free.
